Hailey Adopts Police Policy Resolution CITY OF HAILEY RESOLUTION NO. 2020-81

WHEREAS, the Hailey Mayor and City Council are acutely aware of the national and local dialogue pertaining to systemic racism and injustice that pervades national and local institutions; and

WHEREAS, the Hailey Mayor and City Council respect and support the men and women of the law enforcement profession, appreciating the honor, enthusiasm, and assistance shown by Hailey Police Department personnel toward the citizens and businesses of Hailey during this trying year; and

WHEREAS, the Hailey Mayor and City Council recognize that individual good intentions and performance are bolstered by clear policies, equitable protocols and substantial training; and

WHEREAS, the Hailey Police Department spoke with forthright candidness in early June, 2020, participating in the nationwide shock, dismay, sadness and rage surrounding the death of George Floyd while in law enforcement custody, stating that "What happened to Mr. Floyd is inexcusable"; and

WHEREAS, the Hailey Police Department has taken action to safeguard the wellbeing of the community, stating that action to be "not as a show of authority, but as a sign of protection of our City's residents and visitors, its businesses, its overall infrastructure, and most importantly the safety of those peacefully protesting with the intention of keeping the peace and giving the community peace of mind that HPD has the community's back during these difficult times"; and

WHEREAS, Hailey Mayor, City Council and Hailey Police Department have been and continue to be a partner with community organizations that help eradicate inequities, such as NAMI, The Advocates for

Survivors of Domestic Violence, Hunger Coalition, ARCH, St. Luke's Center for Community Health, The Senior Connection, and Blaine County Housing Authority; and

WHEREAS, Hailey Mayor and City Council have participated in the funding of organizations dedicated to the needs of the disadvantaged within our community; and

WHEREAS, the Hailey Mayor and City Council endorse Hailey Police Department's review and improvement of department policies to assure that policies and training protocol carry authority greater than that of any individual, position, and even Idaho state law; and

WHEREAS, the Hailey Mayor and City Council support the improvement of safety protocol for its police department.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAILEY, IDAHO, that the City of Hailey wholeheartedly endorses the following amendments to Hailey Police Department's Policy and Procedures:

To continue prohibiting the use of chokeholds; and
To ban the use of tear gas; and
To require a verbal warning if the situation dictates the officer can do so before using deadly force;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that these policy amendments be implemented, discussed and trained immediately by the Hailey Police Department, adding them to the approximately 316 page Hailey Police Department Policy manual, knowing that these amendments can reduce and control the use of force without compromising officer safety.

Voters Extend Local Option Tax

Hailey city officials express their gratitude to voters who turned out in record numbers to a May election which was conducted exclusively by mail. The community participating during a pandemic is gratifying on its own terms.

A Hailey Local Option Tax measure had been put to voters in that election for an extension to the year 2050. No other changes were implemented within Hailey’s Local Option Tax which would have otherwise expired in 2030.

Under heavy voter turnout, 1087 voters were in favor of the measure and 260 were opposed. With 60% voter approval needed to pass, the measure carried strongly with 80.7% of voters approving the measure.

In past years, the LOT revenue within Hailey has been distributed to several areas of expenses, including snow removal, street maintenance, transportation, events, downtown and park improvements through city services and a contract with The Chamber, emergency services including police officers, police and fire vehicles. The Local Option Tax comprises approximately 10% of the City of Hailey’s general operating revenue.

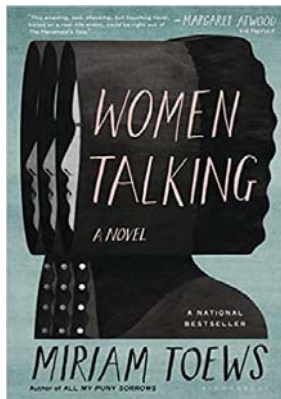

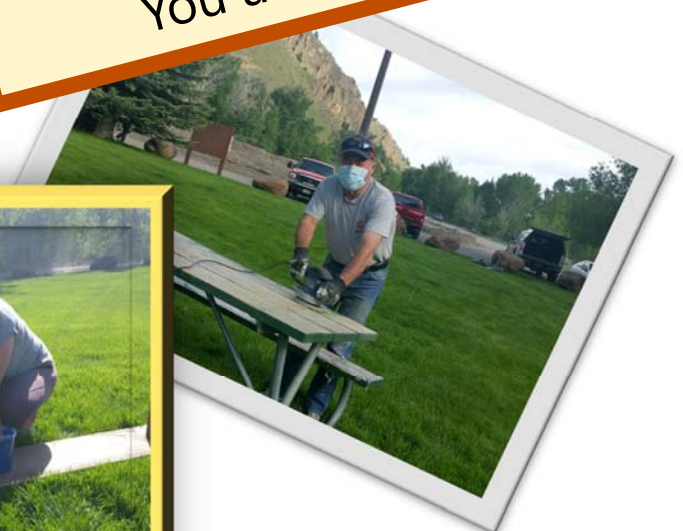

CITY OF HAILEY
PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY ORDER No. 2020-05

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a respiratory disease that can result in serious illness or death, is caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus, which is a new strain of coronavirus that had not been previously identified in humans and can easily spread from person to person. The virus is spread between individuals who are in close contact with each other through respiratory droplets; and

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the International Health Regulations Emergency Committee of the World Health Organization declared the outbreak of COVID-19 a public health emergency of international concern; and

WHEREAS, the CDC reports that people are most COVID-19 contagious when they are most symptomatic (the sickest) however spread is possible before people show symptoms, or by those that are asymptomatic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Idaho Governor Brad Little signed a declaration of emergency for the State of Idaho in response to concerns that cases of COVID-19 are imminent in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, on and after March 13, 2020, the Idaho Governor issued a series Orders addressing public health measures to slow the spread of COVID-19 including the current **Stay Healthy Order** signed May 30, 2020, and inclusive of the Idaho Rebounds Plan; and

WHEREAS, as of June 30, 2020, Idaho was reporting 5,752 total cases of COVID-19, including 209 new cases on June 29, 2020 and 91 deaths to date; and

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2020 the Mayor of the city of Hailey declared a local disaster emergency, and on March 23, 2020 the Hailey City Council consented and adopted the Declaration as per the Disaster Preparedness Act (Title 46, Chapter 10 of the Idaho Code), in the city of Hailey due to the threat that COVID-19 poses to the health and welfare of the residents of Hailey; and

WHEREAS, on March 24, 2020, the Council for the city of Hailey adopted Ordinance 1260 establishing emergency powers that provide the authority, purpose, and intent of emergency powers to address the threat of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the emergency services and local healthcare facilities have limited capacity to handle a significant increase in COVID-19 confirmed cases in Blaine County; and

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends that people wear cloth face coverings in public settings, especially when other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain; and

WHEREAS, there is a continuing and urgent need to protect all residents, employees and visitors in the city of Hailey from the risks relating to the COVID-19 pandemic through the protection provided by wearing facial coverings; and

WHEREAS, the city of Hailey Mayor and City Council find it necessary to enact additional regulations to strengthen the May 30, 2020 regulations contained in the Department of Health and Welfare Stay Healthy Order to slow the community spread and protect the health, safety, and welfare of individuals living, working and visiting the City of Hailey; and

WHEREAS, this Order was considered and approved by the City Council in accordance with provisions of Emergency Ordinance 1260;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Mayor and City Council do hereby adopt the following regulations, which shall supersede all prior Public Health Emergency Orders issued by the City of Hailey, and which shall be in effect until rescinded, superseded or amended by the Mayor or City Council.

SECTION 1 FACE COVERINGS

Every person, shall, when in any indoor or outdoor public place, completely cover their nose and mouth, when members of the public are physically present for otherwise unprotected social interaction.

1. **DEFINITIONS:** For purposes of this Public Health Emergency Order “public place” shall mean any place open to all members of public without specific invitation, including but not necessarily limited to, retail business establishments, government offices, medical, educational, arts and recreational institutions, public transportation, including taxi cabs and ridesharing vehicles. “Members of the public” shall mean persons not therein employed, present without invitation.
2. **EXEMPTIONS:**
 - a. Children under the age of 5.
 - b. Persons who cannot medically tolerate wearing a face covering. A person is not required to provide documentation demonstrating that the person cannot medically tolerate wearing a face covering.
 - c. Persons who are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication.
 - d. Persons, including on-duty law-enforcement officers, for whom wearing a face covering would create a risk to the person related to their work, as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.
 - e. Persons who are obtaining a service involving the nose, face, or head for which temporary removal of the face covering is necessary to perform the service.
 - f. Persons who are eating or drinking at a restaurant or other establishment that offers food or beverage service, so long as the person is able to maintain a distance of 6 feet away from persons who are not members of the same household or party as the person.
 - g. Outdoor public places where people can employ social distancing as recommended by CDC.

SECTION 2 PENALTIES

Any person who violates any provisions of this Order, shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a fine of \$100.

SECTION 3 EFFECTIVE DATE AND SUNSET DATE

This Emergency Order shall take effect at 12:00 a.m., on July 1, 2020 and shall remain in effect until rescinded, superseded or amended by the Mayor or City Council.

Signed by Mayor Martha Burke
